Christian agape meal at a tomb in the Catacomb of Saints Marcellinus and Peter, Via Labicana, Rome, We believe that the Eucharist draws us into communion not only with Jesus, as we receive his body, but also with our fellow Catholics, who are members of his body. Nonetheless, most Catholics feel disconnected from one another, coming to their parish for Mass and leaving quickly afterward. It's

hard for the Eucharist to become the center of our lives that way, let alone to build a vibrant culture through the parish. In any age, a community will be strong when its members depend upon one another and build a common life together. Charity, above all else, characterised the early Christian community and caught the attention of pagans. Christians cared for one another and also did what they could to care for anyone in need. This charity became expressed in what was known as an "agape", a meal or feast to express the love of the community. Early Christian meals were prone to abuse, as we see in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, where he said that rather than caring for the needy, some Christians indulged in excess. Likewise, Jude, in the 12<sup>th</sup> verse of his letter, spoke explicitly about the agape meal, telling Christians that their love feasts were blemished by looking first after themselves. These dynamics haven't changed much. (From The Catholic Reporter.)

The Pope said there are already many first fruits from the ongoing Synod, but added that more time is needed in order for them to become fully mature. "In order to provide more time for extended discernment. I have established that this Synodal Assembly will take place in two sessions: The first on 4-29 October 2023 and the second in October 2024." Pope Francis said he hoped this decision will "favour the comprehension of synodality as a constitutive element of the Church, and help everyone to live it as a journey of brothers and sisters who bear witness to the joy of the Gospel."

The XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, will be extend to "non-bishops" (priests, deacons, consecrated men and women, laity). This choice is in continuity with the progressive appropriation of the constitutive synodal dimension of the Church and the consequent understanding of the institutions through which it is exercised.
